The Society of Physics Students is a professional association explicitly designed for students. Membership, through collegiate chapters, is open to anyone interested in physics.

At the local level you will meet others who share your interest in physics and have the opportunity to participate in the varied activities of the chapter, e.g., special lectures, physics projects, and outreach activities.

As a member of the national SPS you will receive *Physics Today* (monthly), *The SPS Observer* (quarterly), *The Journal of Undergraduate Research in Physics* (online); be eligible for SPS scholarships, internships, research & travel grants, fellowships and other awards; and be able to access the Career Placement Service of the American Institute of Physics.

You will also receive information and announcements about regional, national and international physics meetings and of SPS research sessions at professional society meetings. And, if you are an undergraduate, you also qualify for free membership with an AIP Member Society (for up to three years, undergraduates only—see application form).
